A Hero's Welcome For Nicole Loudon



Nicole Loudon, Passaic County's all-time highest scoring high school basketball player, returned to the John F. Kennedy Educational Complex gymnasium on Feb. 7 where her Lady Knight's number 11 was retired. Loudon scored 2,928 points – more than any other Passaic County player, male or female – before graduating from Kennedy High School in 2001. Loudon was as competitive in the classroom as she was on the basketball court, and earned a full scholarship to Auburn University in Alabama where she played all four years. Loudon

went on to play for Jamaica's national basketball team, and competed in countries all over the world including Israel, the Czech Republic, and Spain. In 2015, Loudon earned her Master of Business Administration from Cornell University. Many of Loudon's family members joined her for the ceremony, as well as her high school varsity basketball coach, Lou Bonora. "Nicole is proof-positive that hard work can make dreams come true," said Superintendent Eileen Shafer during her remarks at the ceremony.

African-American Ancestors Honored at Public School 13

The ceremony ended with participants singing, *Lift Every Voice And Sing*, the African-American national anthem.

Surrounded by many of his coaches and his brother, Miguel, John F. Kennedy Football Knights defensive lineman Jaysen Triunfer signed a letter of intent and scholarship agreement from Fort Scott Community College (FSCC) in Fort Scott, Kansas. In signing the letter, Triunfer accepted a full scholarship awarded to him by the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) school. Triunfer is a senior at STEM Academy at the John F. Kennedy Educational Complex who intends to major in forensic science. He made the second All-Passaic County football team last

season. He will report to practice in July.

Paterson Music Project Winter Concert Features Young Paterson Musicians

More than 200 Paterson Public Schools elementary and middle school students performed in the Paterson Music Project's Winter Concert on Feb. 2 at the Rosa L. Parks School of Fine and Performing Arts (RPHS). The Paterson Music Project (PMP) provides after school music instruction at Public Schools 1, 26, the Norman S. Weir School, as well as the Paterson Community Charter School. In her remarks, Superintendent Eileen Shafer thanked RPHS Principal Jalyn Lyde and Arts Supervisor Michelle Van Hoven for opening the school to the program. She also thanked PMP Program Director Elizabeth Moulthrop, PMP Education Director Shanna Lin, and Helen Cha-Pyo, the artistic director for PMP's umbrella organization, the Wharton Institute for the Performing Arts, for their efforts.

RPHS Drama Students Portray Plight of the Urban Middle Class



Drama students at Rosa Parks High School of the Fine and Performing Arts (RPHS) recently performed *You Shouldn't Have Told*. The play by Anne Thompson-Stretching depicts a middle-class, African-American family who live amidst the urban realities of Brooklyn's Brownsville section. They confront issues of sexual abuse, family betrayal and a tragic death. After a matinee performance, the school's guidance counselors assisted in a talk that featured some of the cast members.

Young Men's Leadership Academy Hosts Family Day

The Young Men's Leadership Academy hosted "Family Day" on Jan. 31. This event gave parents and other family members the opportunity to experience the school's learning process by spending time in the classroom during instruction.
