Rosa Parks High School (RPHS) students augmented their learning through a number of recent field trips. For Halloween, some RPHS attended a performance of *Tales of Edgar Allen Poe* at the Pax Amicus Castle Theater in Budd Lake. Students saw a remarkable show where Poe's tragic life, violent passions and breathtaking tales of terror were all woven into a tapestry of drama, comedy, music and horror. "The show was very exciting, and scary," said junior Jennifer Guizar. "And as a writing student, I was able to learn a lot about his life and how he wrote his incredible stories."



Other RPHS students attended the Dodge Poetry Festival in Newark. The event, which took place from Oct. 17 through Oct. 21 at several venues, featured more than 60 poets and musicians. Students saw several established artists perform their pieces and took part in creative workshops that discussed the process of writing and performing poetry.

"The poets who performed had pieces that were really impactful with very human elements to them, making them hit really close to home," said junior Shiqira Poulson. "Once they were done performing, we could ask them questions based on their writings and personal experiences. Overall, it was a truly moving event."

RPHS drama students took their first of four field trips to see productions at Ramapo College. The production was *Anonymous* by Naomi Iizuka. This production was directed by Ramapo Professor Mary Ellen Allison and lighting was designed by Rachel Budin, who is also the coordinator of the partnership. *Anonymous* explores what it is like to be a refugee in the United States. The themes of the production were then reviewed with a 30-minute discussion with cast members.

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## Anti-Bullying and Martial Arts at Public School 7

Renshi David, the instructor from the Elite Martial Arts dojo in Rockaway, provided anti-bullying training to students at Public School 7 on Oct. 22. Through David's different scenarios, students learned what behaviors are considered to be bullying, and what behaviors are not. David also taught students to think about what causes bullying and how to use those ideas to de-escalate a bullying situation without violence or arguing.

"I enjoyed it very much because the trainer made whatever he did funny," said one seventh-grader, referring to how the event was filled with entertaining and probable scenarios. This student added how he immediately applied strategies he learned into his daily life. "You've got to be attentive wherever you go and keep your head up," he said.



Finally, students were taught ways to mentally and physically demonstrate confidence as a proactive measure, which may reduce the likelihood of a bully attack, according to David.

"If this presentation is able to protect at least one student from being the victim of bullying in the future, then it was well worth it!" said Principal Rebecca Cecala.

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## Collaborating And Celebrating Hispanic Heritage Month

The students from the New Roberto Clemente School and the Newcomers Academy recently collaborated on a Hispanic Heritage Research Project. The purpose of the project was to practice English and Spanish as well as learning to interact with one another.
